The Chairman's Report

This is the first ever bi-annual report, due to the sudden viral pandemic of COVID-19 in February 2019, which is still active. At the AGM on 8th May 2019, just one day after my retirement following 16 years as a City Councillor, I became Parish Council Chairman for the sixth time. I have served as a Parish Councillor since 1975.

Initially, Coronavirus caused multiple significant challenges, principally the day-to-day running of the Parish Council, with the Clerks having to work from home, projects being delayed or put on hold and regular Council meetings being disrupted. However, the Council has shown great ability to adapt to these difficult times, and while it is not quite yet business as usual, it is certainly much closer to it. Parish Council meetings are taking place virtually via Zoom, which the Councillors have all been able to master, and the Clerks have returned to the office for most of their working week.

Members of the public are welcome to attend virtual meetings. The login details can be obtained by contacting the Clerk, and questions or comments should be received at least 24 hours prior to the meeting. Agendas and minutes are available on the Parish Council's website.

Despite the pandemic, several projects have taken place, notably the building of a new pavilion on the Hartley Trust Playing Field, Scotby, which is now almost complete and should be open in late Spring. The Wetheral Playing Field is to have a Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA), subject to planning permission, which will be financed by Section 106 money from the Priory Grange development. The Parish Council has secured grant funding for improving the pond area at The Strand in Aglionby. So far, the area has been weeded and cleared of Himalayan Balsam and the pond has been cleared of vegetation. Some tree work has been carried out to improve light. The area will be replanted with pollenating and fruit-bearing plants to help attract birds, bees and insects, and paths will be laid to make a pleasant communal area.

The Parish Council's Planning Committee scrutinises all Ward planning applications submitted to the City Council, as well as applications for tree work in Conservation Areas and trees with Tree Preservation Orders (TPOs) on them. Over the last two years we have had multiple applications for gypsy pitches off Broomfallen Road, Scotby, which, though objected to by the Parish Council and refused by the City Council Development Control, have been approved by the Government Planning Inspectorate.

Another contentious application was for some 90 properties at "Rookery Close", made by Gladman. This was rejected by the Parish Council and refused by the City Council, with around 750 objections from the local community. Gladman re-applied and were again refused, with a similar number of objections, and refusals once again from both the Parish and City Councils. At the time of writing, Gladman have submitted an appeal to the Secretary of State.

I wish to express my gratitude to Sue and Lynsey, my two Clerks, and Mick, the Cemetery Groundsman. I would also like to thank the committee Chairmen, namely Councillor Pattinson - finance, Councillor Evans - Rights of Way, Councillor Hughes - Cemetery, and Councillor Oliver, my Vice Chair, as well as all my fellow Councillors who dedicate their time and commitment to the Parish.

Multi-Use Games Area, Wetheral

A MUGA is due to be installed on Wetheral Playing Fields in 2021 (subject to planning permission), using Section 106 funds from the housing development at Priory Grange. The facility will be provided to allow free access to an all-weather surface for sports and recreation, predominantly for children and young adults from the village.



Projects for 2020-21

Aglionby Pond Restoration Project

In 2019, the Parish Council obtained grant funding to restore the pond and small woodland area in Aglionby, with the intention of turning this under-utilised area into an attractive place for residents to enjoy and for wildlife to thrive. Although the planned schedule of work suffered a lengthy delay due to Covid, the project is now underway



thanks to our contractors from Cumbria Wildflowers, as well as work from some of our Councillors and a small team of volunteers from the village. The pond and surrounding area have been cleared of litter and debris, a strimming and spraying programme has started, and some tree work has been done as part of the woodland management plan. There has been a lot of hard work involved in removing invasive plants, most notably Himalayan Balsam, but there's plenty more to do!



Future phases will involve improving drainage to the pond and putting measures in place to improve the water quality and prevent pollution from traffic run-off. There will be an extensive planting programme of native shrubs, grasses and flowers, and habitats will be installed for wildlife.

Scotby Pavilion

The long-awaited rebuild of the pavilion on the Hartley Trust Playing Fields is now well underway. The rendering is complete, the glazing is in and the internal plastering has been finished. This impressive, modern building with its upgraded facilities will provide an excellent home for the sports teams based in Scotby and



a valuable facility for the wider community. Using the pavilion as a base, local clubs will be able to grow and develop. The pavilion will be a positive environment and a focus to encourage active, healthy lifestyles for the people of Scotby and beyond. The setting will also make it a great venue for parties, christenings and family events.

The pavilion has been funded through grants and donations.

Speed Watch

The local Speed Watch group, a band of volunteers led by Parish Councillor Geoff Round in conjunction with Cumbria Police, is ongoing. Speed Watch is based in Cumwhinton and began some three years ago, when Cllr. Round took part in an exercise with the police to make motorists more aware of the dangers of speeding in villages. A particular problem was identified in Cumwhinton, and the police asked Cllr. Round to organise a Speed Watch group in the village.

Although some locals did have initial reservations, it was gradually acknowledged that the Speed Watch group was necessary and that speeding in Cumwhinton was posing a serious risk to horses, cyclists and pedestrians, including school children. Support in the village increased to such an extent that one resident purchased a speed gun, which was presented to the Parish Council to enable Speed Watch to be carried out more regularly. The group also extended its operations to Wetheral, where a second group of volunteers was set up.

Since the Speed Watch group started, hundreds of instances of speeding have been recorded in Cumwhinton. Many of the cases involved vehicles travelling at almost 60mph, nearly twice the 30mph speed limit. COVID-19 restrictions have resulted in a temporary suspension of the group's activities, but it is hoped that the vaccination programme and gradual lifting of lockdown will mean that additional training can take place and operations can resume in the coming months.

The Speed Watch group is always looking for volunteers. The Parish Council receives frequent complaints about speeding from residents in various villages, but does not have the resources to cover them.

Other News

The Parish Council was able to make use of a grant to fund the purchase of a supply of spring bulbs for each village. These were planted by volunteers at various spots on the road verges. Volunteers have also been out and about throughout the year picking litter from the hedgerows. Unfortunately, litter and occasional fly-tipping remain problems for the community, but the Parish Council is grateful for the support of the City Council in backing up its efforts.

A group has started work on tidying the car park at Wetheral station. Network Rail has now replaced the fence, which has made a great improvement.



The Parish Council was able to give assistance to the SWWATCH

(Scotby, Warwick, Wetheral and the Cooperative Hearts) community support group, which helped almost 200 people in the area during COVID-19, mostly during the first lockdown. 30 volunteers carried out more than 500 tasks, including collecting medication and delivering food and other essentials.



New play equipment, a train and trampoline, was provided for the play area at Turnmire Common in Wetheral.


Milk vending machine for Wetheral?
